CIMULACT

National Report on Malta's National Citizen Vision Workshop

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Summary

This deliverable presents the results of Malta's National Citizen Vision Workshop, held on Saturday 5 December, 2015 between 09:00 and 17:30 at the Grand Hotel Excelsior, Floriana (within walking distance of the main bus terminus and offering free parking for participants).

Thirty eight people attended the workshop. Originally 50 people had been approved, but 4 people sent their apologies soon after they received the confirmation and 4 sent their apologies the evening before the event. A total of 42 people were expected to attend and 4 did not show up on the day. The diversity of participants was well balanced with roughly a similar amount of males and females, reasonable age distribution, and diverse geographical spread (four people came from the island of Gozo).

It was not easy to motivate citizens to apply to attend the workshop. Adverts in a national newspaper were featured, an interview was held on the University of Malta radio station (Campus FM), the event was announced daily on the cultural calendar of Campus FM for two weeks, the CIMULACT Malta Facebook page was used to motivate citizens to apply to attend the workshop, and numerous personal and academic networks were utilized. It appears that each of these channels attracted citizens as participants were asked how they heard about the workshop on the consent forms.

Everything went well during the workshop and six interesting visions were generated. The final visions are mainly focused on topics related to the environment, sustainability, education, and a fair, diverse and equal society. The raw visions provide more diversity of topics when compared to the final visions. These include concepts such as peace, better quality of life, democracy, nature and reduced consumption.

People were very positive about the whole experience and provided interesting feedback. However the citizens had a great deal more energy and enthusiasm in the morning. It was not easy for some tables to reach consensus and for the citizens to collaborate in the afternoon when they worked on their Raw Visions and Final Visions. As happened in other countries, some citizens whose preferred vision was not selected as a Final Vision were demotivated and some lost interest.

At times there appeared to be a generation gap clash with some older people hanging on to entrenched (as opposed to flexible or collaborative)

attitudes and creating mini-conflicts which were not easy for the table facilitators to resolve. The diversity of gender and age may be considered as both a plus and a minus. Some people enjoyed exchanging views across generations, others suggested it may have been better to split people on tables depending on their age group. One person said this may have led to more diverse final visions as similar age groups could have been more 'daring' and 'adventurous' rather than 'accommodating' due to various pressures to collaborate and to end the day with one vision per table.

All in all it was a very challenging, interesting and rewarding experience and the Malta team looks forward to the next steps in the CIMULACT process.

Table 1: At one with the Environment

Describe your vision in 2050:

In our vision, we have a cleaner world to live in. Stronger emphasis on local economies reduces carbon footprint of goods resulting in cleaner seas and cleaner air. Tariff barriers are put in place to tip the balance in favour of sustainably produced goods. A move towards cleaner types of renewable energy and bigger incentives against individual car use. An introduction of environmentally friendly measures, such as green rooftops, reforestation, unbiased research, prohibitive fines against pollution, responsible waste disposal and better education to increase awareness.

In your desirable future, what is different from today?

No pollution, there are more green open spaces, there are less diseases and illnesses since an environmentally conscious way of production food is healthier. There is a better appreciation of all that is natural and what is man-made compliments or builds upon the natural, as opposed to eradicating it.

Is your vision desirable for everyone? Are there any concerns?

This might limit economic development for poor countries that rely on the current industrial model for the economy. This is not desirable for corporations that outsource the manufacturing of their goods to less environmentally conscious countries. (Feedback: our vision was criticised on being too focused on eliminating undesirable outcomes through aversive methods. This however might not be realistic as positive reinforcement, however ideally it would work better when not used as a stand-alone measure. People might be more motivated to work towards a goal when both measures are used.)

In short, what is your vision?

Respect for the environment, cleaner lifestyles.

Table 2: Better quality of life towards sustainable approach to local and global issues

Describe your vision in 2050:

Focus directed on – water, housing, overpopulation, and crime.


Water: a) society collects water (i) responsibly and (ii) by enforcement, b) better desalination through (i) renewables e.g. solar panels, (ii) nuclear energy – nuclear waste might be, in 30 years, cleaner.

Housing: affordable housing for everyone regardless of wage

Overpopulation: Global campaign on education toward sustainable family planning was successful.

Crime: Less crime

Table 3: Education leading to a new way of life

Describe your vision in 2050:

Educating our children is important to our future. The children of the raw vision 2016 are now 35 years old. Their children are now starting their educational journey of their own. This is how it looks:

- Home Environment: The home is self-sufficient with sustainable energy production, example: solar panels, waste separation, waste minimization, better use of water (RO, recycling plants, rain water storage). Houses have gardens and they grow their own food. No plastic waste. Organic waste used as a source of energy (methane).
- Family: Strong values, especially family values. These allow better caring for elderly and to build strong relationships between children, parents, and grandparents. Children actively playing with other children, doing physical activities, and have balance with use of technology for playing and learning. A simple lifestyle that does not necessitate the parent to work long hours, thus spending more time with the children, family and friends.
- Culture and heritage: Children learn from their parents and grandparents mistakes not to be repeated. Family quality time allows values to be passed on.
- Environment: Clean energy that does not damage the environment. Efficient and pollution free public transport.

In your desirable future, what is different from today?

With more educated and caring children, the greener environment, cleaner energy source from solar, wind, and water energy, result in less cost to each household, and less waste. Public transport (more efficient than today's) relieves the need of pollution-causing cars, especially if they can take the work force to the work place. This means less cars on the road and less stress. With education came healthier lifestyle. This means less of a burden on public health system. Education can also lead to communication and integration of different people.

Is your vision desirable for everyone? Are there any concerns?

Unfortunately, the vision is not desirable for everyone. If their goal is solely their profit margin, such people will not profit from this goal, and can actually hinder the progress of the vision. The excessive dependence of electronic devices during childhood give rise to concerns.

In short, what is your vision?

- Continuity from one generation to another, will make for a more stable family which in turn makes for a more stable society. Learning from past mistakes helps us to make better choices in the future.
- Life balance is very important for wellbeing of society.

Table 4: Sustainable and Equitable Society

Describe your vision in 2050:

In 2050, all members of society have equal access to quality education and opportunities to engage and contribute equitably to fair-decision making and all other processes that affect their lives. Family units in their various forms are accepted and supported to ensure that each individual is embedded in a nurturing social system. Children are introduced to sports/exercise at an early age. Overpopulation is addressed, ensuring available resources are sufficient for everyone's needs. People are free to practise their religion; without imposing their view on others. The Earth's natural resources are nurtured; depleted forests are regenerated; energies are renewable; buildings are eco-friendly; animals are treated ethically. All individuals contribute to the economy, generating enough profit to obtain the resources they need to enhance their quality of life, without harming other or the environment. Perceptions of need are tapered to minimise materialism and waste.


A society where its citizens are all socially integrated on a harmonious equal level. All citizens are civically educated to make decisions on their own society in the most direct, fair transparent way.

Raw Vision 1.1: A Real Government for the People

Number of votes: 23

Number of votes: 9
